

Facts About Refugees

- 1. A refugee is a person who has been forced to leave his/her homeland and is unable to return because she or he has experienced persecution or has a wellfounded fear of persecution. Persecution can be related to race, nationality, religion, political opinions, or membership in a particular social group.
- 2. There are 26 million refugees around the world, with 57 percent from just three countries: Syria, Afghanistan, and South Sudan.
- 3. More than half of the world's refugees—51 percent—are children.
- 4. Most refugees wait an average of 17 years in a refugee camp or in urban areas outside a camp before returning to their country or resettling in a new country.
- 5. Each year, less than one percent of the world's refugees are resettled to a new country.
- 6. Turkey is the top hosting country for refugees with a total of 3.6 million. Lebanon hosts the largest number of refugees relative to its national population.
- 7. Refugees are the most thoroughly vetted individuals entering the United States, with vetting taking a minimum of several years and most often many more years.
